Welcome to the Port Melbourne Life Saving Club (PMLSC) Annual Report for the 2023/24 season. We want to express our heartfelt gratitude to all of you for your unwavering support throughout this season. Without your dedication and commitment, we wouldn't have achieved all that we did.

Reflecting on the season, we started off with a bang! Our members participated in a variety of events, including the Greek Cross, Clean Up Australia Day, and many more exciting activities. Our club has been actively involved in community outreach programs. We have partnered with local schools to provide water safety education, and our members have volunteered at numerous community events. These efforts have helped to raise awareness about the importance of beach safety and the role of lifesaving clubs. Additionally, we assisted Teresa in fighting for her lease to keep Caffe Di Lido in Port Melbourne. Teresa is a valuable asset to our community who ensures our parents have coffee at each nipper session, spreads safety messaging to the local community, looks after our patrollers, and is always there for us when we need it.

We are proud to have over 1,200 members at PMLSC, this represents a 20% growth in our membership, reflecting our club's vibrant community and the dedication of our members.

We have participated in various leadership camps hosted by Life Saving Victoria, including:

- Junior Development Day

PMLSC successfully ran several specialized patrols, keeping our members engaged throughout the patrol season:

- Pink Patrol
- Rainbow Patrol
- Green Patrol
- Blue Patrol

Additionally, we assisted the South Melbourne Life Saving Club with the running of the Beach Warrior program.

We completed a 24-hour row for Gotcha4Life, an Australian not-for-profit that delivers mental fitness programs. We raised over \$4,000 to support their bespoke mental fitness programs in schools, sports clubs, and communities, helping them achieve their vision of a zero-suicide future. A big thank you to all who made this event possible: our club volunteers, members, parents, and the kind businesses who made donations, donated goods, and supplies. The vibe in the club was palpable, even during the overnight shift, and energy levels were kept high.

Our financial position remains strong, thanks to prudent management and successful fundraising. This year, we have been able to invest in new equipment, including rescue boards and first aid supplies, ensuring that our members have the best tools available to perform their duties.

We hosted our annual Nippers Emergency Services Week, which included visits from:

- Police Helicopter
- Highway Patrol
- Ambulance Victoria
- And many more

We expanded our Nipper program to include two holiday programs in January and April. We are the first club in the world to run such a program for long hours. By introducing young children to surf lifesaving, we are nurturing the next generation of lifesavers, ensuring the future strength of our club.



Over twenty members attended the City of Port Phillip ANZAC Day service and laid a wreath, representing both Life Saving Victoria and Port Melbourne Life Saving Club. We also participated in and represented Life Saving Victoria at the Huntingdale 2023 Emergency Services Golf Day.

## Club Captain's Report



As we conclude another remarkable season, we are pleased to present the Annual

Club Captain's Report for the 2023/24 season. This season spanned 176 days, from November 1st to April 25th. It has been a period marked by outstanding dedication, community engagement, and the relentless pursuit of excellence in lifesaving and water safety.

This year, we successfully provided an additional twenty hot weather patrols beyond our scheduled dates, demonstrating our commitment to the safety of our beachgoers. Our members went above and beyond, assisting neighbouring clubs including

Sandridge Life Saving Club, South Melbourne Life Saving Club, St Kilda Life Saving Club, and Sandringham Life Saving Club during times of low personnel. These collaborative efforts underscore the unity and support within the lifesaving community.

The statistics for this season are a testament to our team's hard work and vigilance:

- Preventative Actions: 1,679
- Minor First Aids: 17
- Major First Aid: 1
- Rescues: 10
- Beachgoers Kept Safe: 37,709

Furthermore, 22 of our dedicated members logged over 100 hours of patrol time, including one first-year Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) holder. Their exceptional commitment is both commendable and inspiring.

In a poignant tribute, the Port Melbourne Life Saving Club held an honour guard and observed a minute of silence to remember Ross and Andrew Powell and all our fallen lifesavers. This solemn ceremony served as a heartfelt reminder of the sacrifices made by our lifesaving community and reinforced our dedication to their legacy.

Our club's outreach efforts this season were significant:

- Primary School Water Safety Training: Approximately 15,000 students received vital water safety education through our program. We also provided essential safety support for local high schools' water sports programs.
- Cold and Conscious Group Events: We offered water safety and first aid support for two events, with around 200 participants benefiting from our services.



- Greek Cross Blessing: We ensured water safety during the annual blessing of the waters, upholding our commitment to community traditions and safety.

By engaging in these extensive activities, we fulfilled our strategic objective of enhancing water safety in our local community. Our members have not only safeguarded lives but also served as exemplary role models, promoting the values of service and responsibility.

The new IRB Driver and Crew course was released and we hope to have our trainers and assessors skilled up to run the IRB award before the start of the season to help fill some gaps in our Patrol teams.

Belinda put through many Age Manages again this season providing essential resources to run our popular Nippers Program.



## Nipper Report



The Nippers program at Port Melbourne Life Saving Club continues to grow year, stronger each becoming а cornerstone of our community outreach and engagement efforts. This season, we experienced a substantial increase in enrolment, with 353 nippers participating, marking a 31% growth. The majority of our nippers come from the local area, underscoring our deep-rooted connection with the Port Melbourne community.

In addition to our nippers, we had an impressive 150 Award members serving as Age Managers, ensuring that each child

received quality instruction and guidance. These Age Managers are vital to the program's success, providing mentorship and support to our young lifesavers.

The comprehensive curriculum, based on Surf-Ed references from Life Saving Victoria (LSV), ensures that our nippers gain essential lifesaving skills and knowledge. By the end of the season, the progress and confidence displayed by our nippers were remarkable. Key skills developed include:

- Rip Identification: Understanding and spotting rips, which is crucial for water safety.
- CPR Training: Learning the techniques and importance of cardiopulmonary resuscitation.
- First Aid Skills: Basic first aid, including Teddy Aid, to handle minor injuries.
- Beach and Water Safety: Practices for staying safe on the beach and in the water.
- Board Handling: Techniques for using boards to catch waves and navigate the surf.
- Running and Diving: Improving agility and water entry skills.
- Teamwork: Fostering a sense of cooperation and mutual support among peers.

The success of our Nippers program is heavily reliant on the active participation of parents. This season, numerous parents undertook training to become Age Managers, ensuring they were well-equipped to support the program. Each session also benefited from the assistance of Surf Rescue Certificate (SRC) holders and patrollers. On average, we had 70 helpers per session, including parents, SRCs, and patrollers, highlighting the strong community spirit and collective effort.

SRC members were assigned to each age group to demonstrate activities, while patrollers provided oversight, ensuring the safety of all participants. This collaborative approach not only enhanced the learning experience for our nippers but also reinforced the community's commitment to lifesaving.

Our commitment to providing top-notch training is reflected in our ongoing investment in equipment. Each year, we upgrade or replace nipper equipment to maintain high standards. When new activities are introduced, we promptly source and purchase the necessary equipment to ensure our nippers have the best tools for their training.





The post-session sausage sizzle, complemented fresh by fruits and vegetables, has become a beloved tradition for our nippers. This season, a dedicated group of members took charge of purchasing, cooking, and serving the food, ensuring that our young lifesavers enjoyed a nutritious and delicious end to each session. This communal meal fosters a sense of camaraderie and provides an opportunity for social interaction among nippers and their families.

This season, we proudly launched our Nipper holiday program, a pioneering initiative in Australia. We held week-long programs in January and April, each attracting over 100 participants. This

program was a resounding success, thanks to the support and contributions from our community. The high demand has encouraged us to plan for an expansion of these holiday programs in the coming season.

The 2023/24 season has been a testament to the strength and vitality of our Nippers program. The dedication of our members, the enthusiasm of our nippers, and the unwavering support of our community have all contributed to a remarkable year.

## School Program Report



Port Melbourne Life Saving Club has been running school programs for the past 17 years. Our programs first started with Wembley Primary School and ran a Meet a lifesaver program for Williamstown North Primary School.

Port Melbourne Life Saving Clubs school programs are in a growth phase gaining attention from schools right across the state. This season we decided to re name our school programs and are now known as SPLASH! standing for Safety & Prevention: Learning lifesaving skills At the Shoreline and in the H2O. This has been a fitting change for our programs.

Due to the increased growth of SPLASH, we have employed a bookkeeper and all helpers are now casually employed by Port Melbourne Life Saving Club. Additionally, we gave our program guide a facelift clear and precise communication is being made between our club and schools.

This season, we ran a year 7 leadership program for Albert Park College, an Aquathon program for Year 10 students from Huntingtower School, A beach visit for students from Concord School and Bug a Lugs After School hours care from the Macedon Ranges and a Year 5&6 water safety program for Wembley Primary School. Port Melbourne Life Saving Club also did a program for the Werribee Council to provide a program for children within the local community. We have also run meet a lifesaver program at various schools across Victoria. Overall, we educated more than 2,000 students across Victoria this summer through SPLASH.

Our 10-week Lifesaving Program with Albert Park College. In conjunction with Life Saving Victoria the Year 7 students complete a lifesaving program that forms part of the school's curriculum that we will offer for each starting year of the college. This program introduces lifesaving and club activities which we hope will encourage the students to become patrolling members of Port Melbourne.

We would like to thank the students and teachers from Wembley Primary School, Albert Park College and Huntingtower School, Concord and everyone else who have requested to do the program again next year. We have additionally had South Yarra Primary, Ripponlea Primary and Middle Park Primary who have locked in programs for the 2023/2024 season.

A special thank you to my regular helpers who assist with the running of these programs. Without the help of these members our programs wouldn't be possible and the club's mission of educating our local community wouldn't be possible. These members include Joe Mercieca, Nick Strang, Peter Bellion, and Imogen Cooper.

We look forward to continuing to run our school programs at throughout the next season.



## **Clubhouse and Facilities Report**



As our club goes from strength to strength in its 111th year, it is pleasing to see, it has been another year of growth, resulting in great successes and momentum throughout the club. As the PMLSC offers many inclusive opportunities to enter lifesaving, through Patrols, Nippers, BM, SRC and Holiday Programs, it is more and more important that our facility and equipment stand up, through reliability and lifespan of usage. Once again, our equipment audit preseason sees us have great assurance and valuable knowledge aligned with information to pass on to our fellow volunteers, to ensure all equipment is operated with integrity, providing maximum benefit and impact. Our strong commitment to equipment upgrades enables us to sign off with confidence that we are "Rescue Ready" at all times for the up-andcoming season.

As many would know, there is never a dull moment at the beach and around the club, amongst all the preventative actions and lifesaving operations, over the course of the summer, we encountered a cricket infestation of armageddon proportions. Fuelled by a bizarre weather circumstance (not one of the bat and ball variety), it was through the dedicated efforts of many, to roll up their sleeves and clean up, prior to any Club Operations, Nipper and Holiday Programs commencing. Unbeknown to most and a mere blip on the radar, it was another fine example of the can-do attitude of the Port Melbourne LSC committee and members, getting the job done, to keep the engine running.

Once again our VSEP and BSEF Emergency Service grants were acquitted to ensure that our First Aid, Patrol Equipment and IRB Operations are upheld and through the reliability of our service providers we are able to maintain valuable resources, such as IRB's, ATVs and Patrol Boards. We added additional Rescue Boards to our fleet, coinciding with 2 New Pride Boards to represent our commitment to inclusion and equality. We have also seen the Patrol Trailer provide a continual valuable resource as a one stop shop on the sand, allowing us to respond rapidly to those in need by having first aid, oxygen and rescue equipment on hand. This along with a new improved sunshade awning has given Bronzies, Patrollers and Club Volunteers, added protection whilst representing the club on the beach, always making them fully accessible and visible to the public.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank the committee for their ongoing support and all those who have contributed to helping me within my role of equipment and facility management in 23/24, Brett Armstrong, Peter McLaverty and Joe Mercieca, without your help, we couldn't achieve bigger picture opportunities and further identify grants and ways to make our club stronger. As we place a lens on the 24/25 season we continue to rotate and upgrade equipment which has become redundant. Furthermore, our ability to invest in Nipper boards plays a key role, increasing the skill acquisition of our youth and aligns with our responsibility to maintain machinery and patrol equipment. It is our ongoing vigilance towards responsible watercraft and jet ski activity, that safety of beach goers is paramount. This has seen



us invest in new binoculars and monoscopes to ensure the correct information is communicated at patrol tower level to Water Police, should we experience inappropriate behaviour and unsafe actions in and around our PMLSC boundary.

Last season we have seen increased usage of the club and our ability to embrace a wider spectrum of community groups through lifesaving and education, has been a focus. This not only identifies the need for our services and options we provide, but it also drives the need for the City of Port Phillip to continually support and upgrade our facility. With this said, we continue to have ongoing talks with the council to amend the clubhouse facility to provide further convenience and accessibility to all members. With \$250k of government funding allocated, it will be an ability for us to navigate the best solution for the club alongside council to ensure funds utilised effectively and not dissolved unnecessarily in the planning phase, leaving us with little or no funds to fulfill our needs. As a result, we hope to upgrade our female and male toilets and create a family change alternative, within the current footprint. All talks with the council have been positive, and they are always impressed with how we go about things at the PMLSC, but most importantly how we get the most out of our facilities and equipment. Let's keep up the great work, continue to be vigilant and respect all things in and around our club, as if it were our own.

Finally, it is the annual implementation of the Water Wheelchair (WWC) which continues to receive a great amount of usage over the summer months, through the booking system via council and through a "walk up" capacity. This gives many patrollers and users a broader view of the importance of ensuring everyone has a safe and enjoyable day at the beach. With Port Melbourne being a key venue for installation of the beach mat, it has flagged us as a club that goes the extra yard to provide service and community along the Melbourne foreshore, further demonstrating our commitment to inclusion. This has seen other clubs follow in our footsteps to lead the charge for more beaches along the bay, to provide this much needed service.

On a personal note, I wish to acknowledge and appreciate all the collaborative and team responses over the course of the season, advising me from damage or repairs to potential initiatives. This provides us with time to "React, Resource and Rectify" giving an ability to provide the necessary feedback to Age Group Managers as to the importance of care and respect for all equipment, passing on knowledge to our children.
